What should I do

Identification

- Sticky when touched.
- Leaves covered in tiny white hairs.
- Unpleasant yet subtle smell.
- Likelier on roadsides and rocky removed areas.

1. If the plant has bloomed and/or seeded (forming a pappus or bristle ball):

1.1. Wrap the plant from the top in a plastic bag and use it to pull and uproot the groundsel. Please also make sure to pick any stray bristles.

1.2. Tie the bag with a knot and, if possible, cover it with some other waste before disposing of it in the nonorganic container.

2. If the plant is young and has not bloomed, uproot it and leave it on the ground.

If the plant was found away from MAGIC / LST, please report its location to La Palma Biosphere Reserve (invasive plants LIFE project).
